

But thanks to people like you, there were other special places to explore.





Tragically, North America has lost nearly 30 percent of bird populations since 1970—more than 2.9 billion birds!

That's sobering news when you consider birds indicate the health of our land and water resources.

Your faithful support made a difference for land conservation and our fine feathered friends.

Land trust leaders participated in an Ask An Expert webinar entitled *Birds as Conservation Catalysts*. The presentation highlighted how birds can help promote land protection.

Thanks to your generosity, land trust leaders also learned more about Wisconsin's Important Bird Areas (IBAs).

Undertaken in collaboration with the Wisconsin Bird Conservation Partnership, a study was commissioned to help land trusts and other conservation partners prioritize the protection and management of critical nesting sites and key stopover areas for birds during migration.


Wisconsin Land Trust Days events in August and September. Keep an eye out for an updated list of events at HaveFunOutside.org in July.
